Arne Jacobsen was born on February 11, 1902 in Copenhagen to Johan Jacobsen, a wholesale trader, and Pouline Jacobsen, a bank clerk. The family lived in a Victorian house with elaborate decoration, which influenced Arne's early artistic expression as he painted his room white. He met Flemming Lassen at boarding school, who would become his architectural partner. Arne was a restless student who excelled in drawing, particularly representing nature in a realistic way. He began traveling at 20, visiting New York, Germany, and Italy to learn about architecture. His watercolors produced during these travels showcased his talent for capturing atmospheres and materials. Jacobsen's personality is reflected in his work: modernist, perfectionistic, yet nature-loving and jovial. Arne Jacobsen, a renowned designer from Denmark, had created a beautiful and simple table clock that adorned every home. The clock was initially designed in 1939 for H.J. Hansen, who later became the director of Lauritz Knudsen. This design marked the beginning of four significant contributions by Jacobsen to Danish design history. The clock was presented at the Spring Exhibition at Charlottenborg and featured both an alarm and snooze function, along with a light triggered by an invisible sensor. Jacobsen's classic design made it a timeless piece that every home cherished. In addition to his work on table clocks, Arne Jacobsen had also designed other notable items such as graphic designs for Lauritz Knudsen's electrical appliances. His minimalist aesthetic and attention to detail were evident in these early works, which have now been produced by Rosendahl. Jacobsen's career was not limited to design; he was also an accomplished architect and furniture designer. His legacy continued through his wide range of graphic designs, including typefaces, packaging, posters, patterns, and clocks.
