Jacobsen's personality is reflected in his work: a blend of sharp modernist sensibilities, perfectionism, love for nature, and joviality. His designs aim to achieve harmony between form and function, resulting in precision and warmth. Throughout his career, Jacobsen maintained an affinity for foreign cultures while staying true to Danish traditions. Jacobsen's iconic clock face design for Lauritz Knudsen around 1941 exemplifies his pursuit of simplicity and modernity in design. His architectural endeavors continued to push the boundaries of Scandinavian minimalism, cementing his status as a master of Danish Modernism. Arne Jacobsen's designs weren't limited to furniture, but also included a wide variety of graphic elements like typefaces, packaging, posters, patterns, and even clocks. His early Station clock face is an example of his minimalist style, despite being created many years ago. This classic design is now manufactured by Rosendahl.
